CHRISTIANITY CAN BE A RIOT - PART 1

Acts 19:21-20:1 | Pastor T. H. Moore

s we read the end of the nineteenth chapter of the book of Acts, we come to the close of the apostle Paul's Ephesian ministry. Although it takes only a few minutes to read of the events that occurred in Ephesus, in actuality, it had been two and a half years since the apostle Paul arrived in Ephesus and made that place his headquarters. It had been a very fruitful and encouraging ministry, but also a very dangerous ministry, for we read in Acts 19:10, "And this continued by the space of two years; so that all they which dwelt in Asia heard the word of the Lord Jesus, both Jews and Greeks." We also read in Acts 19:20, "So mightily grew the word of God and prevailed." However, not long after this, a very serious incident took place right before Paul left Ephesus.

In the city of Ephesus, people were being saved and lives were being changed. People were turning from their sin, idolatry, and vices, and in verse 21 of this chapter, we read that the apostle Paul "purposed in the spirit" to go to Jerusalem and then on to Rome. Then, in verse 23, there arose a big stir about the effect that the gospel was having upon the idolatry that was being practiced in Ephesus. A silversmith by the name of Demetrius, who made silver shrines for Diana, called together the workmen and delivered them a speech which is recorded for us in verses 25-27. Demetrius told the workmen how Paul's preaching was affecting their livelihood by persuading people to turn from the worship of Diana, and his speech caused them to become very angry. In verse 29, tempers escalated

and the workmen caught two of Paul's co-laborers, Gaius and Aristarchus, and brought them into the theater-but when Paul was about to go into the theater, the disciples would not let him go in. It was evident that Paul's life would have been at risk if he did so. Things escalated and a great riot erupted in the city. It was a time of great confusion. For two hours, the people were chanting, "Great is Diana of the Ephesians." Then, in verses 35-40, one of the town officials entered the scene and tried to calm things down by delivering a speech to this angry mob, and after his speech ended, the angry mob broke up and Paul departed from Ephesus and went on to Macedonia.

Do we believe that God still wants to and can do great things in this world?

This incident left such an impression upon the apostle Paul that he refers to it in his second letter to the church at Corinth. He wrote in 2 Corinthians 1:8-10, "For we would not, brethren, have you ignorant of our trouble which came to us in Asia, that we were pressed out of measure, above strength, insomuch that we despaired even of life: But we had the sentence of death in ourselves, that we should not trust in ourselves, but in God which raiseth the dead: Who delivered us from so great a death, and doth deliver: in whom we trust that he will yet deliver us." This incident brings me to the subject that we will be looking at for the next few weeks, "Christianity Can Be a Riot."

It is amazing how timeless the Word of God is. By that, I mean that truth spans all time, and the very things that the early church dealt with are the things that we deal with today. When we read of this incident in Ephesus, we find three primary people that are involved—the apostle Paul, Demetrius, and the town clerk—and I believe that these three personalities could be representative of three types of personalities we see today. Let's consider:

I. The Faithful Paul (vs. 21)

We read Paul saying in this verse, "... I must also see Rome." Remember, the apostle Paul was on his third missionary journey. He had been preaching the gospel and planting churches for eleven years. He had traveled over 3,500 miles and planted churches in the areas of Asia Minor, Macedonia, and Achaia. He had spent the last two and a half years in Ephesus preaching the gospel, teaching and discipling people, and grounding this new church in the Word of God, and in verse 21, Paul had "purposed" in his spirit to see Rome also! He had his eyes fixed on the very capital of the Roman Empire. Paul knew that there was more ground to take for Christ. He knew that there were people that needed to hear the gospel. Paul was determined to do everything within his power to do more for the cause of Christ. What a faithful man! Would to God we were all like the apostle Paul in that we believe that God still wants to and can do great things in this world!

> We've also been on the road quite a bit this year. We went to Georgia earlier this month to repair the main transmitter there and to switch the station to the new satellite. On the way home, we stopped and switched several more that were along our pathway home.

> FBN has to move to a new satellite because the life of the one we are on is fading. Right now, the satellite company is allowing us to be on the old and the new during this transition at no extra cost until April 14th. David has been coordinating with our affiliates on this. The movement from one satellite to the next is very minimal in aiming the dish. As the affiliates line up someone to aim the dish to the new satellite, he helps by phone and then can remotely change their receivers to the new frequency if he has access to it. We greatly appreciate and need your prayers for safety in our travels and in the work.
